HOME IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM (HIP)

The Board of Freeholders through the Community Development Office Offers a home improvement program for income eligible homeowners who live in one of our CDBG participating communities except Camden City, Gloucester City, Gloucester Twp. And Cherry Hill

Improvements can include Heating, Plumbing, Electrical, Roofs and Carpentry. Improvements are based on eliminating health and safety hazards for low to moderate income homeowners.

Income eligibility is based on the Section 8 guidelines. Homeowners must live in the property, taxes must be currently and have homeowners insurance.

Funding is made available as a deferred payment loan. No interest accrues or monthly payments required. A lien is placed on the property, when it is sold the funds are paid back to the program to assist another Home Owner in the future. Currently there is a waiting list.

LINDENWOLD POLICE DEPARTMENT

POLICE CHIEF MICHAEL MCCARTHY



Chief Michael McCarthy was promoted to his new position effective January 1, 2007 after serving as the Deputy Chief for the past sixteen years. He is now serving in his 37th year as a member of the Lindenwold Police Department. Over those years he has established broad experience in the concepts of patrol procedures, criminal investigation, and police administration. He began his law enforcement career by attending Municipal Police Training at the New Jersey State Police Academy. He is a graduate of the F.B.I. National Academy and the West Point Command & Leadership Program.

Chief McCarthy's immediate focus is on reducing the reportable crime statistics for the Borough of Lindenwold. The plan is high police visibility with particular attention to targeted areas, supplemented by proactive patrol throughout the town. "We intend to approach those people who come into town to conduct criminal activity. Zero tolerance will be the policy."

On a different note, the Chief is looking forward to the much needed renovations and expansion of the police department. In short the lack of proper working space, as well as storage space, has been a major problem. Now movement is currently underway to address these problems.

Chief McCarthy has made a firm commitment that he and the members of his department will work along with the Borough Officials to address the issue of "order maintenance". Quality of life issues will be addressed and support will be given to our Code and Compliance Officials. "I truly believe by working together we can accomplish a great deal and I'm committed to this concept."

STREET LIGHTS

To report streetlight outage or any other streetlight repair call the public works department at 856-783-1848. The Public works department relies heavily on the public to inform us when a street lights have burned out.

TRACKING BRACELETS PROJECT

You can get a transmitter bracelet to help locate a loved one with dementia after wandering off on their own. The wrist-watch-bracelets send out a signal that can be picked up within a mile by trackers in Sheriff's Department cars. Sheriff's officers also carry hand-held units that allow them to trace a signal. One 71-year-old participant was found within two hours after he had left his home wearing only a jacket and an Eagles cap against the frigid mid-February temperatures. Called the Lifesaver Project it is funded by the Camden County Freeholders and administered by Sheriff Chuck Billingham.

KEEPING OUR STREETS CLEAN

On April 11, 2007 Mayor and Council passed Ordinance #1205 about street sweeping.

Be It Ordained by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Lindenwold, County of Camden, State of New Jersey, as follows:

1. Council may, by resolution, prohibit on a temporary basis, all on street parking on any Borough road.
2. In the instance of street sweeping operations, the Borough shall post the dates, times and streets to be swept on the Bulletin Board in Borough Hall where notices are normally posted. On street parking for the posted streets shall be prohibited for the day and times posted. Any vehicle parked in violation of this section shall be subject to being towed and the owner shall be responsible for the costs of towing and storage of the vehicle plus a fine in an amount to be set by the Lindenwold Municipal Court.

The Street sweeping program is responsibility for the cleaning of all Borough streets. The positive feature of street cleaning includes safety, economy and community appearance.

Depending on manpower available the department's goal is to have every street cleaned once a month from March 1 to October 31. For more street sweeping information call the Public Works Department at 856-783-1848.

KEEP LINDENWOLD BEAUTIFUL

Every person has a stake in their community, including a stake in the community's litter problem. Research and experience tell us that litter attracts the eye and, at times, litter attracts MORE litter, and that a clean community discourages littering and illegal dumping. Proper handling of litter and waste in a community raises the standards and expectations of everyone.

Litter is the result of too little attention to how waste is handled — the careless and casual handling of waste creates litter. Knowing more about the causes of litter and where it comes from is a good place to start in addressing litter prevention. One person, one business, one organization can positively affect the behavior of others in our community.

Why People Litter

It has been determined that people litter because

- They feel no sense of ownership, even though areas such as parks and beaches are public property.
- They believe someone else—a park maintenance or highway worker— will pick up after them.
- Litter already has accumulated.

Who Is Littering?

There is no such thing as a single "littering type". People of all ages and social backgrounds have been observed littering, ... men and women, children, mature adults and all ages in between are equally likely to litter. Today's litterer can no longer be described as a pick-up truck driving young man — today's litterer may be you.

"Litter-Known" Facts

We know that there is no such thing as a single littering type. What we do know is that there are seven primary sources of litter:


- Pedestrians or cyclists who do not use receptacles.
- Motorists who do not use car ashtrays or litterbags.
- Business dumpsters that are improperly covered.
- Loading docks and commercial or recreational marinas with inadequate waste receptacles.
- Construction and demolition sites without tarps and receptacles to contain debris and waste.
- Trucks with uncovered loads on local roads and highways.
- Household trash scattered before or during collection.

No matter where litter starts, it moves. From streets and highways to parks and waterways. Wind and weather moves litter around a community, into the gutters, planted gardens, alleyways and parking areas. In one study, researchers found that 18% of all littered items end up in our streams and waterways as pollution.



LAUREL LAKE CLEANUP ON SATURDAY MARCH 24, 2007.

Members of the Lindenwold Environmental Commission, as well as residents and the Lindenwold Public Works Department, picked up trash and removed branches and muddy leaves from Laurel Lake on Saturday March 24, 2007. Girl and Cub Scouts from Lindenwold and Laurel Springs also took part in the clean-up. Earlier in March, Laurel Lake was lowered, which provided more access to the land and allowed debris to surface out. It marked the perfect opportunity for a clean-up effort. Girl Scouts from Troops 16, 616 and 6 contributed to Saturday's clean-up as part of the "Turf to Surf" project. To earn that badge, a Girl Scout must clean-up a place in their community, such as a park or waterfront, in March according to Darlene Campbell, a leader of one of the troops who participated. We want to thank the Girl Scouts, Cub Scouts, residents, and Lindenwold Public Works for making a difference in the restoration and preservation of one of Lindenwold's precious lakes.

SOLUTIONS TO STORM WATER POLLUTION

Pollution on streets, parking lots and lawns is washed by rain into storm drains, then directly to our drinking water supplies and the oceans and lakes our children play in. Fertilizer, oil, pesticides, detergents, pet waste and grass clippings end up in our water.

Stormwater pollution is one of New Jersey's greatest threats to clean and plentiful water and that's why we're all doing something about it. By sharing the responsibility and making small easy changes in our daily lives, we can keep common pollutants out of the stormwater.

As part of New Jersey's initiative to keep our water clean and plentiful and to meet federal requirements, many municipalities and other public agencies including colleges and military bases must adopt ordinances or other rules prohibiting various activities that contribute to stormwater pollution. Breaking these rules can result in fines or other penalties. As a resident, business or other member of the New Jersey community, it is important to know these easy things you can do every day to protect our water:

Limit your use of fertilizer and pesticides:

1. Do a soil test to see if you need a fertilizer
2. Do not apply fertilizers if heavy rain is predicted
3. Look into alternatives for pesticides

4. Maintain a small lawn and keep the rest of your property or yard in natural state with trees and other native vegetation that required little or no fertilizer
5. If you use fertilizers and pesticides, follow the instructions on the label on how to correctly apply it.

Properly use and dispose of hazardous products:

1. Hazardous products include some household or commercial cleaning products, law and garden care products, motor oil, antifreeze, and paints
2. Do not pour any hazardous products down a storm drain because storm drains are usually connected to local water bodies and the water is not treated.
3. If you have hazardous products in your home or workplace make sure your store or dispose of them properly. Read the label for guidance.
4. Recycle used motor oil.
5. Contact your municipality, county or facility management office for the locations of hazardous waste disposal facilities.

Keep pollution out of storm drains:

1. Municipalities many other public agencies are required to mark certain storm drain inlets with messages reminding people that storm drains are connected to local water bodies.
2. Do not let sewage or other waste flow into a stormwater system

Clean up after your pet:

1. Many municipalities and public agencies must enact and enforce local pet-waste rules.
2. An example is requiring pet owners or their keepers to pick up and properly dispose of pet waste dropped on public or other people's property.
3. Make sure you know your town's or agency's requirements and comply with them. It's the law: Remember to do use newspapers, bags or pooper-scoopers to pick up wastes, dispose of the wrapped pet waste in the trash or unwrapped in a toilet and never discard pet waste in a storm drain.

Don't feed wildlife:

1. Do not feed wildlife, such as ducks and geese in public areas.
2. Many municipalities and other public agencies must enact and enforce a rule that prohibits wildlife feeding in these areas.

Don't litter:

1. Place litter in trash receptacles
2. Recycle, recycle, recycle
3. Participate in community cleanups

Dispose of yard waste properly:

1. Keep leaves and grass out of storm drains
2. If your municipality or agency has yard waste collection rules, follow them.
3. Use leaves and grass clippings as a resource for compost
4. Use a mulching mower that recycles grass clippings into the law.

RECYCLING TONNAGE REBATE PROGRAM

The Board of Chosen Freeholders of the County of Camden have authorized an agreement with the Pollution Control Financing Authority for the creation, maintenance and administration of a fund for recycling tonnage rebates for Camden County municipalities that dispose of waste at the Authority's facilities. The term of the above agreement is for one year, commencing October 1, 2006 and terminating September 30, 2007.

Rebates are available to municipalities who successfully maintain a recycling program and such municipalities are eligible to receive money from the fund based upon the amount of recyclables recycled for a specified year. These funds are used to support the town's local recycling program.

The amount to be paid to each municipality is determined by the total tons of fiber and commingled containers recycled by the municipality in the previous year. Based on the 2005 year-end report, the Borough of Lindenwold received a recycling rebate in the amount of \$10,732.95. It is with great optimism that the town will receive this rebate once again for recycling during the 2006 calendar year, which will not be determined until October 2007.

Congratulations to all the residents for your participation in the town's recycling program, and an enormous thank you to the Public Works Department for all their hard-work in making the recycling program a success!

SUMMER SAFETY FOR CHILDREN

Spring is upon us and summer is right around the corner, which means children are beginning to be active outdoors once again. Please take the time to speak with your children about street, playground, pedestrian and bicycle safety. A major concern to all of us is **dangerous strangers**. The following are ways on how to protect our children and teach them about **stranger danger**. Please take the time to review these safety points with your children and grandchildren.

Safety rules regarding dangerous strangers:

- Never talk to strangers. Never let a stranger get too close, whether he or she is in a car or walking.
- If a stranger needs directions let them ask an adult
- Do not walk in or close to the street
- Never take candy, a present, a ride, or anything from a stranger
- Never tell a stranger your name or address. If the stranger knows your name do not be tricked, he/she may have heard someone call you or seen it on your book bag.
- Never go with a stranger to find a lost puppy
- Always try to walk with a friend or grown-up

- If a stranger grabs you, yell as loud as you can for help while trying to break free
- If a stranger said that your Mom or Dad sent them to get you do not believe them. If there is an emergency your parent/guardian would send a trusted adult.

If a stranger follows you:

- Run to a place where there are people, like a store or restaurant
- Run to the nearest home, bang on the door and ring the doorbell
- Don't run to any place that is dark or deserted

If you are home alone:

- Never open the door to anyone knocking or ringing the bell
- If you look through a window and see a Police Officer knocking on your door, or someone in plain clothing who tells you they are an undercover Police Officer, and you feel uncertain or confused dial 911 to confirm that you should open the door for the Officer.
- Never tell anyone calling on the phone that you are home alone.
- Make sure all doors and windows are always locked

How parents can help their children be safe:

- Define for your child who is a "stranger"
- Never mark your child's outer book bag, clothing, etc. with his/her first name
- Never leave small children home alone or alone in a vehicle. You may run into a store for "one minute" but it only takes a few seconds for a stranger to drive away with your vehicle.
- Make sure your child knows their **full name, address, and phone number**
- Keep a recent photo of your child and a mental note of what they are wearing each day
- If your child is old enough to walk to a friend's home alone, make sure they call you when they arrive and when they are leaving

Pedestrian Safety:

- Always utilize the crosswalk if one is available
- The safest place to cross it at the corner of each block /intersection
- Never enter or cross the street in between parked cars
- Look **LEFT, RIGHT, and LEFT** again
- If you do not feel safe than do not cross

UNITED STATES AVENUE BRIDGE OPENING



The old bridge had been in such poor condition that it had been closed to vehicular traffic since 2000. The existing three span bridge was built in 1904 and rehabilitated in 1984, however the bridge exhibits advanced deterioration and was in poor overall condition.

The \$7.3 million state funded project was completed and opened to traffic on December 8, 2006. The project provides a new vehicular bridge over the New Jersey Transit Atlantic City Rail Line as well as the rehabilitation of the existing bridge for pedestrian and bicycle use. The new bridge is a one span steel structure using low maintenance weathering steel. Unique tapered piles have been used on the project to reduce the depth of the piles for the bridge abutments. This helped reduce driving time during construction and saved the Department money. This project is an excellent example of environmental sensitivity with a bridge preserved as an historic resource and the new bridge designed contextually complimentary to the railroad corridor. Benefits of the new bridge to the borough and the surrounding areas are a decrease in traffic congestion at all three crossings in Lindenwold.

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Did you Know?

The first church was built in 1859, The Watsonstown Methodist Protestant Church which was located on the westside of the White Horse. The church was demolished during the 1960's. The second church built was the Lindenwold Union Sunday school. This was built in 1889 at Linden and Bryant Avenues. The old Union Sunday school site is currently the church home of Christ Community Church. The pastor is the Reverend David P. Horrocks.

Did you know the third church to be built in Lindenwold was St. Lawrence Roman Catholic Church? It was built in 1897 on the east side of the White Horse Pike. The Reverend John O' Leary was the first rector, from 1896 to 1902. The cost to build the church was \$2,700.00. A fire, which begun in the choir loft at 2:00 AM destroyed the original church in 1899.

On August 10th, 1903, the cornerstone for the second church was laid. The second structure costs \$5,500.00 to build. In 1958 the church was again destroyed by fire. The sum of \$389,000 was pledged by members of the parish on July 12, 1959.

To this day, St. Lawrence continues to serve our community and provide a quality education for our youth.

The Linden tree remains our Borough seal.
